

Resilience Building and Recovery Programme for Ukraine

April 2022



The war in Ukraine has already resulted in significant loss of life, unprecedented displacement, and devastating destruction of infrastructure. [Early UNDP projections](#) suggest that up to 90 percent of the population of Ukraine could be facing poverty and vulnerability to poverty by the end of 2022. Eighteen years of socio-economic achievements are at risk.

The complex humanitarian, development, and peace challenges now emerging in Ukraine underscore the importance of programming that responds to the multiple dimensions of the crisis. This means supporting and leveraging the resilience of individuals, communities, and institutions to provide immediate life-saving assistance while protecting core government functions and public service delivery.

The Resilience Building and Recovery Programme for Ukraine is grounded in working in partnership with sister UN entities and beyond. UNDP is fully integrated within the humanitarian architecture, including the Humanitarian Flash Appeal and the Regional Refugee Response Plan. UNDP is joining up with its sister humanitarian and development agencies, and development partners around supporting and investing in the resilience of its long-standing partners in Ukraine - Government, private sector, and civil society.

Three pillars of support:

SUPPORT THE GOVERNMENT-LED CRISIS RESPONSE AND PUBLIC SERVICE DELIVERY AT NATIONAL AND LOCAL LEVELS

- Strengthen capacities for crisis management and emergency response.
- Support mine action authorities and emergency service responders to protect civilian population from explosive ordnance and environmental hazards.
- Support debris removal and solid waste management.
- Repair critical social and physical infrastructure and housing to ensure public health, safety and service provision.
- Increase access to public services for conflict-affected populations, including IDPs, elderly, minorities and people with disabilities.
- Support the Government's management of humanitarian and early recovery assistance.
- Facilitate impact assessments, data collection and analysis to support planning and accelerate the transition from humanitarian assistance to early recovery.

LEVERAGE UKRAINE'S HIGH HUMAN CAPITAL, PRODUCTIVE CAPACITIES AND NATURAL RESOURCES TO MEET IMMEDIATE HUMANITARIAN NEEDS AND STRENGTHEN SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC RECOVERY

- Provide emergency livelihoods and income-generating solutions for conflict-affected persons.
- Help the private sector to respond to immediate needs by providing locally produced goods and services.
- Support conflict-affected women in livelihood recovery, skills development, business support, access to finance, networks and markets.
- Promoting green transition and decarbonization by investing in environmental clean-up and remediation, clean transport, and sustainable energy production and use.

STRENGTHEN UKRAINIAN INSTITUTIONS AND CIVIL SOCIETY TO MAINTAIN THE SOCIAL FABRIC, UPHOLD HUMAN RIGHTS, AND ENSURE INCLUSION, PROTECTION AND EMPOWERMENT OF ALL PEOPLE

- Strengthen social bonds by engaging civil society in humanitarian and recovery efforts, community-level dialogue and conflict resolution activities.
- Ensure community security, human rights and access to justice for all people, with special focus on IDPs and vulnerable groups.
